Today is not only the first Sunday of 2019, but because it is the twelfth day after Christmas, today is also Epiphany Sunday, a day we celebrate that the one born in Bethlehem came as a light to all people.

Epiphany comes from a Greek word, epiphaneia, meaning "manifestation or appearance." It has become closely associated with the revelation of Christ in connection with the visit of the Magi who came from a far-off land following a star after discerning the birth of the Savior. The Magi's visit demonstrated that God's blessings flow through Jesus to all nations.

The season of Epiphany, which typically focuses on the growth, life, and teachings of Jesus, extends from today through Transfiguration Sunday which falls this year on 3 March.
